FIFTH GRADE SPANISH students completed their 'Casa de Gabi' (Gabi's house) projects before April vacation. Students had to create what they imagined our character, Gabi's (female kitten) house looked like. Then they had to use the learned house vocabulary and correctly label the rooms and objects in the house using the correct "the" word, write a description of their house with at least five complete sentences all in Spanish and then present their houses to the class. The creativity and effort was amazing! We are very proud of their work.









THE ENVIRONMENTAL CLUB at the middle school has been mostly looking this year at the variety of environmental "programs" already happening in our community at school and the larger community. It has been encouraging and inspiring to see what people are already doing to address the issues.

On April 17th, members of the Environmental Club participated in Maine Big Night and helped escort amphibians across the roads. It was a chilly raw night for us, but the amphibians didn't think so and were on the move to their mating grounds. We found 5 spotted salamanders, 2 American Toads, about 10 peepers and one green frog. We gathered data and will be sending it to the University of Maine organizers.

On April 10th, the Environmental Club went to the high school to see where the compost goes and how it is transformed into rich soil that is then purchased by local gardeners at the annual plant sale. It gave us the whole story on where the food scraps from our school cafeterias go. Moreover, we got a full tour of the Hatchery, which is the maker space at the highschool. The Hatchery is a whole world of discovery for any of you who do not know about it, but I will just tell you that we were particularly interested in seeing their "radical reuse" program. The students deconstruct all manner of constructed things-- wooden pallets, old gym floors, porches-- and reuse the materials to build new items for the school or for other entities. All of that material gets taken out of the waste stream! It is amazing and we were really impressed to see what the industrious high schoolers are up to.
